# **Come to Worship This Sunday!**

One of our members returned from a few weeks of vacation and handed me a stack of bulletins he collected on his Sundays away. It is clear from the bulletins that people worship in a variety of different styles! We Baptists have no prayer book to guide us, no book of "common order" to govern us. No, each congregation makes its own decisions about worship. We express our worship with everything from liturgical formality to charismatic spontaneity. Praise the Lord! Worship happens.

One study has revealed that those born before World War II think of worship primarily as meditation. So keep it quiet. Those born after the war tend to worship primarily as celebration. So let's be joyful in a time of community celebration.

Of course, people often get into healthy disagreements about worship. Do we sing "Amen" at the end of each hymn? Is it okay to play drums in church? Some seek personal and individual inspiration. Others remember Psalm 95: O come let us sing to the Lord ... O come let us worship and bow down. They seek the experience of gathering together as a community. Some are looking to "get" something out of worship. Others look to worship as a time to "give" of themselves to God and see worship as their gift to God.

As you enter these fall months, reflect on the place of worship in your life. Come to worship this Sunday. And don't forget to invite a friend.

#### When the church and family collide

A couple of months ago I preached about the "Orange Concept." The concept is simple – it is combing the love of the family (represented by the color red) and the light of Jesus – the church (represented by the color yellow, and understanding the needs of the two and combing the efforts of both parties to create a force that stands out for its strength and creates the color orange!

I have been meeting with the Board of Christian Education and with Pastor Michael and we have devised the following plan:

- Listed on the back of the bulletin, under the "week at a glance" will be the Sunday school schedule for that day. It will include the room in which the children will be going to for their classes, as well as the topic the children will be learning about in the classroom.
- 2. While we are continuing the "one-room" Sunday school classroom for children in kindergarten through fifth grade, the middle school will be meeting two or three Sundays each month. The first Sunday, Communion Sunday, the middle school youth will stay in worship and participate in Communion (if they have been baptized). The last Sunday of the month is Youth Sunday and the children may be asked to participate in worship. If the middle school youth have Sunday school class it will be listed as to which room they are to go to, if they are to stay in worship it will be noted that way.
- 3. The last Sunday of the month will typically be "Youth Sunday," where the youth participate in worship. To capitalize on the "orange concept" while the children are in Sunday school they will be learning about the same topic the pastor is preaching about at the pulpit.
- 4. To help families open up and discuss their faith together, typically on the last Sunday, when we are all learning the same lesson, there will be an insert in the bulletin that has some "talking points" the family can discuss and pray about over the course of the week.
- 5. Finally, the LOGOS ministry is running on Wednesday evenings through mid-November. This ministry is not only for the children and youth, but also for the whole family. Parents are encouraged to get involved with the ministry by volunteering their time to help in a particular area. This is a wonderful way to not only spend some time with your children, but also to interact with other members of the congregation in a fun and positive environment.

While I continue to seek ways in which we can strengthen our ministries, especially with children, youth and families, I am encouraged by this progress to work together to increase our communication and subsequently increase our faith.

Please let me know if you have any questions about these new plans that are being implemented, or if you have a suggestion to strengthen our ministry together.

## **DID YOU KNOW?**

The following is taken from the book, <u>Haddonfield Historic</u> <u>Homes, Success Through Historic Preservation</u>, published in 1991 and edited by Joan Aiken:

#### **Baptist Chapel**, 1889

402 King's Highway East

This exquisite example of rural Gothic frame churches in New Jersey is one of the treasures of the Historic District. It was built in 1889 with funds raised by the women's group known as the Baptist Social Circle, Inc. of the First Baptist Church of Haddonfield and named the John Sisty Memorial Chapel in memory of John Sisty, a Philadelphia merchant who was licensed to preach by the Mt. Holly Baptist Church and served as pastor of the First Baptist Church from 1819 to 1838

The mortuary chapel was needed to accommodate funerals at the adjoining Baptist Cemetery. Previously funerals had been held in private homes with the coffin maker acting as undertaker.

The Chapel was built on the site of the original Baptist Church building erected in 1819, demolished in 1852, and the site of the second Baptist edifice built in 1853 and torn down in 1885. The land was purchased by the pioneer Baptists from the heirs of Elizabeth West, daughter of John Kay III, who was the grandson of John Kay I who came to West Jersey in 1680 and acquired large holds of land, including the 100 acres called the Lovejoy Triangle which ran along the South side of King's Highway East from Ellis Street to Cooper's Creek.

During World War II, Civil Defense classes for high school students were held in the Chapel. Although it has not been used for funerals for many years, the rear portion houses the cemetery business office and records.

The charming bell tower on the slate roof, the pointed Gothic windows, the portico ornamented with lacy Victorian brackets in the gable, the simplicity and fine proportions exemplify the architectural features that made this rural Gothic Revival church style so popular in the 18th and 19th centuries.

Built right on the street front adjoining the old cemetery which extends several hundred feet on King's Highway, enclosed by hedged walls and stone piers at the entrance to the driveway, the Baptist Chapel and Cemetery present one of the most picturesque sites on King's Highway.
