## EASTER SHEPHERD

**"NOW MAY THE GOD OF PEACE** who brought again from the dead our Lord Jesus, the great shepherd of the sheep. . . "

How would you teach the parable of the Good Shepherd to a class who spoke practically no English? That's what I was trying to do in my LOGOS class of Burmese refugees last week. I began this way, "Who knows what a sheep is?" No response. My explanation began with my sketches and sound effects, both of which elicited laughter from the children. What a pastor won't do to get a message across!

From the little experience I have with the quadruped I can say they are stubborn, wandering and fragile. They have a sense of direction that is determined by the grass in front of their nose. And we, the Bible says, "all like sheep have gone astray." Calling us sheep is far from flattering, rather it points out the flaws in our constitution.

Look at the lives of all the great biblical characters in the Old and New Testaments. Adam ate the apple. The first family produced a murderer. Abraham lied to the Pharaoh about his wife's identity and allowed her to be taken into his harem without so much as a, "Hey, wait a minute!" The patriarchs were all flawed including King David, who was nevertheless called "a man after God's own heart." (1 Samuel 13:14) Jesus' disciples weren't much better.

The biblical accounts are shamelessly transparent. Why? Because they were what we are: a mess. We're flawed. We make mistakes. And the annoying thing is that we remain sheep throughout our lives.

Like sheep we need a shepherd. The good news is that Jesus was our shepherd, and Jesus is still our shepherd. On Easter the Great Shepherd of the sheep rose from the dead. He is still there to guide us, to correct us, to protect us and to redeem us from our own messes.

Yes, we are sheep and throughout life remain sheep. The good news is Jesus Christ remains our shepherd.

## ABCNJ SPECIAL MEETING APPROVES NEW BY-LAWS!

What does this mean?

- The Membership and activities of the 8 associations remains the same.
  - The authority of the churches and their delegates at Annual Session remains the same.
  - The ministry and role of the Executive Minister remains the same.
- Council is smaller in size – 32 members instead of 46.
  - This would include 7 officers, 8 association moderators or their designated alternates, 3 ABCUSA General Board representatives, and the chairs of the 14 region-wide ministries of ABCNJ. Annual Session would vote to approve all Council members.
- Council is composed of associated representatives and representatives from our regional ministries.
  - This arrangements lets the voices of our churches be heard on 3 levels: through direct vote for regionally nominated officers, through association representatives, and through the ministries that are the expression of our cooperative mission.
- Council is empowered to represent the will of the churches in exactly the same way it does now.
  - Council's size and make-up will change, but its function, power and authority will remain the same.

## FROM ENVIRONMENTAL GROUP "GOD'S GREEN HOUSE"

*...observe and seek out all the commandments of the Lord your God, that you may possess this good land, and leave it as an inheritance for your children after you forever.*

— 1 Chronicles 28:8



We have all been affected by the natural catastrophe in Japan. The Atomic Power Plants that were involved also show the manmade potential for catastrophic endangerment to humanity and the environment. Closer to home, we have been speaking of the drilling in the Marcellus shale for natural gas in Pennsylvania and its relevance to our state because it may impact the drinking water and pollute the air quality. Recent headlines highlight the need for better monitoring of the industry and its reporting systems on contaminated wastewater disposal. "There seems to be many inconsistencies in how operators report the wastewater." (Inquirer, 3/10/11) Two large Pennsylvania water providers say they are planning to test public water supplies in response to outcry over a news report that radioactive gas-drilling wastewater may have been discharged into the state's streams. Plans are underway to take monthly radiological samples at two treatment plants. Though the New York Times reported that wastewater at well sites contained elevated radioactivity, the potential health effects are unclear because little testing has been conducted since the shale boom took off three years ago. **Radioactive materials such as uranium and radium occur naturally in deep rock formations and are brought to the surface in the wastewater associated with hydraulic fracturing, the controversial technique that drillers use to release natural gas locked up in the mile-deep formation.**
